

# ARMAGH DOWN / LOUTH PEOPLE'S ASSEMBLY

### A HUGE SUCCESS

Sinn Féin MLA Conor Murphy has said that the huge attendance at the recent Armagh Down & Louth People's Assembly demonstrates the level of interest in planning for a new and united Ireland.

Uachtarán Shinn Féin Mary Lou McDonald was in attendance and gave the opening address at the event.

Conor Murphy said:

"Over 300 people packed into the Carrickdale Hotel on Thursday past to attend the Armagh Down Louth Peoples' Assembly.

"This People's Assembly was an opportunity for citizens from the border region to have their say on the future of Ireland.

"The ill-effects of living under British rule are keenly felt in this area and the implications of Brexit casts a long shadow.

"So too does the British Government's Legacy Bill of Shame, and its mean spirited 'Borders and Nationalities Bill' which makes it mandatory for visitors travelling into the North from the South to firstly obtain an Electronic Travel Authorisation.

"This is the latest threat from London to the people here particularly in this region."

The Carrickdale event was the fourth organised by Sinn Féin's Commission on the Future of Ireland. It was chaired by Dr Conor Patterson of Newry and Mourne Enterprise Agency. The panel



included; Reverend Karen Sethuraman; ICTU Assistant General Secretary Gerry Murphy; Mairéad McAlinden former CEO of the Southern Health & Social Care Trust and Aidan Browne of Dundalk's Dklt's Regional Development Centre.

Conor Murphy continued;

"In addition to an excellent panel, the contributions from the audience were thoughtful, spirited, informed andvery interesting."

In a wide ranging address Mary Lou spelt out the difficulties caused by partition and the opportunities which will be created by ending division. The Sinn Féin President extended the hand of friendship to Protestants and unionists when she said: "To those from the unionist culture I extend a sincere welcome – the new Ireland must be a warm house for all and your traditions and beliefs must be respected and cherished. I invite you especially to be part of the conversation and for us all to plan for the future together."

Mary Lou urged the Irish government to facilitate and support our changing country by establishing a Citizens' Assembly on Irish unity. She said: "This is an exciting time for us all; filled with opportunity and hope for a better future. That's why we need to get it right. Our new constitutional national democracy will emerge from a phased transition and that is why planning and preparation should begin now. Grassroots communities should be involved at the beginning of that process, not at the end."

Speaking directly about the challenges facing the border region Mary Lou said: "Our shared challenge is to create a future which is warm and welcoming for everyone and where the potential prosperity of areas like this border region can be fully unlocked."

# THIS IS THE RISING OF A **NEW GENERATION**

On Easter weekend thousands of republicans gathered all across Ireland, to remember those who have struggled for Irish freedom and to honour those who struck for freedom in Easter Week 1916 and in every generation since.

Easter is an important time where republicans recommit ourselves to the cause of the independence, sovereignty and unity of Ireland and to a 32-County republic based on equality and social justice.

Speaking in Dublin Uachtarán Shinn Féin Mary Lou McDonald said,

"The Good Friday Agreement shows how much can be achieved when we act with common purpose. We have built the peace. Now, we look to write the next chapter - the reunification of Ireland. "I believe that we will see Unity referendums in the next decade. To win these referendums, and win them well, republicans will have to reach out, create space for others and build alliances right across society. "We want to create a nation home for all

our people, where the rights of everyone are protected and advanced. There is no room for trading one form of discrimination for another. We want an end to second class citizenship in all its forms. To build opportunities for everyone.

"A new Ireland based on the vision of Tone, an enduring reconciliation and a real union between the Orange and the Green, and between every community on this island. I want to speak directly to Unionists, and to others who remain unconvinced of reunification. I ask you to join what is the most important discussion of our generation. This is your future too.

"Your culture, your traditions, your history matter. Your voice, your opinions, and your ideas matter. Be part of what is an exciting, positive, and engaging discussion.

"The very best forum for the Unity conversation is a Citizens' Assembly. It would be an inclusive forum for positive discussions on what a new, united Ireland would look like.

"Let me be very clear, if this government refuses to establish a Citizens' Assembly on Irish Unity, a Sinn Féin government will. "This is the rising of a new generation. A rising fuelled by the enduring values of the Irish people - community, compassion, togetherness, and kindness. We seek to build the Irish nation anew. To end partition in our time. To unite our people and our country.

"The gravesides of our patriots are not monuments at which to stand and lament. Rather they are signposts to the future that we will achieve together. A nation is a living, breathing thing.

"It pulses through the hopes of its people to endure, to continue, to reach its destiny, and we will not write the epitaphs of those who lie here until Ireland - united and free takes its rightful place amongst the nations of the world.

"That was the goal of Easter 1916. It is the goal now, and my friends, it will remain the goal until the day it is achieved."

# BREXIT FALLOUT IS DRIVING CONVERSATION ON IRISH UNITY - FINUCANE

The fallout from Brexit is intensifying the conversation on Irish unity, Sinn Fein MP John Finucane has said. Mr Finucane said conversations were taking place now about increasing prosperity and this was woven through the discussion about a united Ireland. "There are those that I talk to that still feel aggrieved that their full European rights and citizenship have been stripped from them in a very undemocratic way because of Brexit and we know that the pathway back to full European reintegration is within the model of constitutional change. "So people are having this conversation and what I find interesting about it is that it very rarely comes down to identity politics.

"People are asking about how we can have a better health system on the one island, how we can have a better education system, how we can increase and build prosperity, and all of that weaves through the conversation on Irish Unity."

## 'I WANT A NEW, BETTER, PROGRESSIVE UNITED IRELAND, ESPECIALLY FOR THE NEXT GENERATION TO ENJOY' - ANDERSON

On April 6th Transform!
Europe held a seminary with their partners across Europe on the 25th Anniversary of the Good Friday Agreement. The four speakers were Professor Colin Harvey QUB, Seán Byers Trademark Belfast, Heinz Bierbaum chair of the Rosa Luxembourg Foundation and Martina Anderson as SF Representative to Europe. During Martina's contribution she said:

"War is a terrible thing. Let's not pretend. But the challenge is how to come out of it, how to succeed in conflict resolution, that is what the GFA showed to the world,

almost a template of how to pursue peace. "Conflicts have only been resolved by engaging with your enemies, negotiating a settlement, talking, and making space for the other. Generosity and all sides moving. "25 years ago, there was no guarantee of certainty. However, there was clearly the potential to arrive at a peace settlement and so the Good Friday Agreement was signed.

"It was the involvement of the international community, the EU, the USA, Canada, and commitments by the South Africans that helped give the push that was needed to advance Ireland's peace process.

"The Good Friday Agreement, gave us power-sharing institutions, a new beginning to policing, all Ireland political and economic institutions and it released political prisoners. But more importantly, it gave us the right to self-determination. For the first time since partition, Ireland could be reunited peacefully and democratically.

"However, the Democratic Unionist Party, opposed the GFA, and it campaigned and voted against it.

"The GFA was not a republican document, it was not a destination, it was a journey and for republicans a journey to a new and better united Ireland. It contained a commitment for Rights in additional to European Convention of Human Rights to be activated through a Bill of Rights. "The Good Friday Agreement made provision for a welter of exciting proposals and commitments through which power could be shared, based primarily on reliance on a charter of equality and human rights and equality legislation



known as Section 75.

"A welter of exciting proposals and commitments – yes. And there is no doubt that we are now in a better place because of the GFA, and all credit to everyone who made that happen. Yet 25 years on, commitments are unrealised and we are in a political crisis with none of the GFA institutions working.

"Brexit has been a disaster for Ireland. The British Government did not give a fleeting glance to the damage that Brexit would do to Ireland. That damage accelerated a conversation that was already underway about Irish Unity. Today, more and more People want to see the Irish unity referendum date set and want the Irish Government to properly plan and prepared for unity referendums through establishing a Citizens Assembly.


"The referendum choice would be to reunite Ireland and for the north of Ireland to move back under the EU roof or for the north to stay with Britain outside of the EU: Stay linked to a country that has stripped away hard-won human rights, has removed the charter of fundamental rights from us, has told us it will remove the **European Conventions of Human Rights,** which is a bed rock of GFA rights; and stay linked to a country that has shown to the world that it will break international obligations by implementing legislation like Legacy legislation and other Bills which do not comply with international human rights standards.

"I am a republican and I certainly want a better future than what is being offered by Britain. I want a new, a b better, a progressive united Ireland and I especially want that for the next generation to enjoy."

#### THE PATHWAY WHICH OPENED UP WAS LIKE A NEW PHASE OF THE STRUGGLE

"The Good Friday agreement wasn't a settlement, the agreement was a commitment or an accord or a willingness to take a new journey, or a roadmap without the destination being agreed.



"We had all agreed to take this new course. People could either at some point agree for Irish unity or could agree to keep the union and that was better than what was there before.

"The Good Friday Agreement has transformed lives and society. "The first acid test is thousands of people are alive, who may otherwise be dead at this point.

"There are half a million people born since the Good Friday Agreement. Unless they were personally affected, that's half a million people who have no recollection of the tragedy and the terror and the difficulties that everybody went through at that time. "Look at what's happening in Syria, look at what's happening in parts of Africa. Look at what's happening in the Palestinian territories, look at what's happening in Ukraine. That's not happening here.

"This is the first generation of republicans who have a mechanism through a referendum, which would allow them to determine their own constitutional future.

"Bobby Sands, Mairead Farrell, they didn't have this type of a mechanism.

"Some people in other struggles are campaigning for the right to referendums. That principle has been conceded here, we have it, it's a matter of when.

"We certainly want to see a referendum but we want to see it preceded by a thoughtful inclusive process of information of debate. We don't want to see a repeat of Brexit. When it comes to the referendum, people will know what they're voting for.

"It just doesn't make sense on a small island like this for the two parts to be facing away from each other.

"I think that it's important to recognise that Irish Unity is not inevitable, but those of us who want it can be involved in a phase of gentle persuasion."

"The Good Friday Agreement delivered peace and transformed Ireland. #### **IRELANDS FUTURE**

Irelands Future this month produced a special 8-pagesupplement in the Irish News marking the 25th anniversary of the Good Friday Agreement, with contributions from political leaders and influencers on how the landmark deal shaped the path towards a new, agreed Ireland. The groups chair Senator Frances Black said, "Questions about how a new, united Ireland is structured and governed will be answered through steps including a Citizens' Assembly before a border poll is held."



The group are planning to publish its Ireland 2030 document later this year that will set out the path that must be travelled between now and the referendum date.



#### **GAELS LE CHÉILE**



#### **UNIVERSITY SURVEY ON IRISH UNITY**

A recent survey by Queens University and University of Ulster has found a plurality of public expectations tilting toward Irish unity and away from the union with Britain. The latest finding, based on 1,405 people surveyed, now finds that 45 percent of people think the north will no longer be a part of the union with Britain 20 years from now. Only 38 percent still think the union with Britain will remain. An even higher percentage – 63 percent, up 5 points from two years ago – thinks Brexit has made unification more likely in any time frame.

#### PERSPECTIVES ON CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGE

A special subcommittee on 'Perspectives on Constitutional Change' has been established as part of the GFA Implementation Committee in the Dáil. A number of topics of discussion have been agreed which the committee will focus on and seek advice on from experts. Topics include Human Rights, Equalities, Women, Finance & Economics, Healthcare, Environment & Natural Resources, Education & Skills and Unionism. The committee have agreed to start on the topic of 'Pensions and Social Security'. The first hearing with Seamus McGuinness, ESRI, Dr Ciara Fitzpatrick, Ulster University and Dr Tom Boland, UCC is due to be held in the coming days.

#### THINKING FUTURES: BUILDING RECOGNITION

An event took place this month in Croke Park which involved a panel discussion with 2 pro-union and 2 GAA panel members who discussed identity and their attitude to the constitutional question/building reconciliation.

This is an initiative of the Institute of Irish Studies, University of Liverpool, and the GAA, which aims to encourage positive engagement and to protect and develop civic space and in doing so promote reconciliation and conflict transformation. This is the first in a series of events planned.



## PREPARATORY WORK NECESSARY BEFORE REFERENDUM - BERTIE AHERN

Speaking at an event held at the Brexit Institute in Dublin last week, Former Taoiseach Bertie Ahern said he "would love" to see a united Ireland.

But he added: "After looking at what happened in Brexit and after looking what happened in the Scottish referendum, any referendum that doesn't comprehensively and in great detail answer and deal with all of the issues will not pass in my view. "Therefore there is a huge amount of work that has to take place on what

work that has to take place on what a new Ireland would look like – how we would integrate all our various administrative institutions? Forget money for a minute, that's another issue, how would you actually do it, how would it function?

"Would Northern Ireland still have an assembly of its own, would people be elected to Northern Ireland Assembly, would they be elected to Dáil Éireann?

"How would we integrate our police forces, how would we integrate our various departments?"

Ahern said he believed this was possible to achieve but the necessary work – such as academic research – had only just commenced.

He added: "I think it is fair to say maybe the first vote will be within the decade, I think that is reasonable, but if the preparatory work isn't done there is no point in having that referendum."

# McDonald calls for Citizens' Assembly on reunification at Liam Lynch centenary

500 people marched up a winding country road to mark the centenary of the death of Irish republican Liam Lynch at his home under sloping mountains near Anglesborough, Co Limerick.

Liam Lynch was shot 100 years ago while on a secret mission in the Knockmealdown Mountains in Tipperary.

"Change is made and history happens because people rise to challenges, rise to the occasion and meet the needs of their people," Uachtarán Shinn Féin Mary Lou McDonald said at the commemoration.

"The landscape of Ireland is imprinted with the legends and legacy of our revolutionary patriots. Those who took on the might of the

British Empire and who fought with great honour for the freedom of Ireland and her people. For the Republic."

"Lynch's dream of an Irish Republic has never been closer.

"Together we will realise the Irish Republic in our time. Now is the time to write the next chapter — the reunification of our country.

"I believe that the Unity Referendums provided for by the Good Friday Agreement will happen in this decade.

"It is therefore vital that the Irish government establishes a Citizens' Assembly to advance an inclusive, all of society national conversation, vital that government plans and prepares for peaceful, democratic constitutional change. To prepare for Irish Unity."
