

# WATERFORD HAS THEIR SAY ON IRISH UNITY

Sinn Féin Waterford TD David Cullinane has thanked all of those who participated in the Uniting Ireland conference that took place in the Tower Hotel on Thursday 12th October. The theme of the People's Assembly was 'The New Ireland is for Everyone - Have Your Say' – and it was the ninth public event held by Sinn Féin's Commission on the Future of Ireland. The next event will be in Conamara on 27th November.

Teachta David Cullinane said: "Almost 200 people attended the conference and for two hours we held a fascinating and interesting conversation on the future of Ireland. At the end of the meeting the packed hall unanimously backed the call for the Irish government to hold a Citizens' Assembly to begin the work of planning for the unity referendum that is part of the Good Friday Agreement.

"I want to thank all of those who attended and contributed and to the panel of speakers – Liz Reddy chaired the event and the panel included Catherine Ní Fhaoláin, John Halligan and Irial Mac Murchú. "The conference was a huge success. The contributions ranged across the adverse impact of partition on Waterford and the southern economy; the advantage of building a single all-island health service funded by direct taxation; the damage done by Brexit; engaging with the Protestant/unionist people, and the imperative of creating a new Ireland that

embraces everyone on the basis of equality and respect.

"In recent years there has been a significant growth in North/South trade which underpins the enormous economic potential that can be generated by unity.

"The debate on Irish Unity is now centre stage. It is a daily topic of conversation for many and the demand for the unity

referendum that is part of the Good Friday Agreement is growing.

"The Irish government is a co-guarantor of the Good Friday Agreement. It has a responsibility to defend the Agreement and part of this must be to plan for the future. We all plan for the future in our lives. The government has to end its resistance to this.

## BELFAST WOMEN AGREE TO ESTABLISH AN

## **INDEPENDENT WOMEN'S ASSEMBLY**

## TO DISCUSS IRISH UNITY

Sinn Féin's Commission on the Future of Ireland last week published the report of the Belfast Women's Assembly which took place in June in the Europa Hotel, Belfast. Over 120 women from across Belfast met to discuss the role of women in the new Ireland.

At a follow-up review meeting the Independent Chairperson of the Assembly Eilish Rooney – an Emeritus Scholar at Ulster University and a member of the Constitutional Conversations Group – welcomed the publication of the report. The meeting agreed to establish an independent 'Belfast Women's Assembly' structure which will meet soon to follow up on the issues raised within the report and to begin preparing and planning for Irish unity.

Speaking at the report launch Deirdre Hargey MLA said:

"From the outset, the Belfast Women's Assembly exceeded expectations. Previously, women had been present and often prominent at public meetings of the Commission on the Future of Ireland. Those meetings hosted contributions from people based on their expertise in advocacy and activism, and in research relevant to local audiences.

"The Belfast Women's Assembly differed in that everyone in the room was invited to have their say, to 'dream big' and speak from the authority of their own lived experience.

"The energy, enthusiasm and serious engagement at the event was simply extraordinary. Contributions throughout the event revealed a clear appreciation of the potential for practical, positive change in women's lives that a new Ireland could bring.

"It was clear on the night that the women in attendance saw the prospect of a unity referendum as an opportunity to plan for a new Ireland that would guarantee women's equality, gender rights and social justice.

"The growing momentum in the debate on the future of Ireland is driving the conversation on constitutional change. In addition, the audience in the Belfast event overwhelmingly supported the demand that the Irish Government establish a Citizens' Assembly on constitutional change."

# Senator Paul Gavan calls on an taoiseach to establish a Citizens' Assembly on our future

Sinn Féin Senator Paul Gavan has responded to the Taoiseach's remarks that a Citizens' Assembly is not the only model available as a forum for inclusive dialogue on a new and united Ireland. Following the Taoiseach's address in the Seanad this month, Senator Gavan said: "I asked the Taoiseach following his special address to the Seanad to begin to plan for constitutional change in Ireland by setting up a Citizens' Assembly. "I also asked him to challenge the British governments' Legacy Bill by taking an interstate action against the British

government in the European **Court of Human Rights.** "The Taoiseach's response to the Citizens' Assembly suggestion was to say it was not the only model available to ensure inclusive dialogue about the future. "I would call on the **Taoiseach to outline his** alternative to the current Citizens' Assembly proposal which has been used to good effect recently in the south of Ireland. "The important issue is that we need as soon as possible an Irish government led, formal and organised, inclusive forum for detailed conversation about Ireland's constitutional future."

# PROTESTANTS AND UNIONISTS



In a significant editorial column, the Irish News edition on 25 September stated:

"Brexit has supercharged the debate on Irish unity. Talk about a border poll is now firmly in the political mainstream."

It was an important intervention which objectively confirms what has been happening in plain sight throughout Ireland.

Brexit has been a game changer for relations between Britain, Ireland, Europe, and the rest of the world.

Those who pushed for the hardest Brexit possible have become the architects of the fragmentation of the once-vaunted 'United Kingdom'.

English Tory interests trumped every other consideration and unionist support for their reckless agenda has now catastrophically backfired on the DUP.

The political and economic fall out, alongside changing demographics in the north have had a major influence on public opinion.

The ground is shifting. Political aspirations

and expectations are changing.

This new impetus for Irish unity is a product of these realignments which in turn throw up unprecedented challenges for how all this

change should be managed.
That got expression in a very concrete way during the recent event organised by Sinn Féin's 'Commission on the Future of Ireland' in Derry City.

The Commission's purpose is to encourage grass roots conversations about the achievement of Irish unity. Established in July 2022, it has now organised a total of eight very successful People's Assemblies and sectoral events throughout Ireland. The next will be in Waterford on 12 October.

The Derry meeting addressed the theme 'Exploring northern Protestant identities and culture in a shared future'. The chair and two panellists were women from Protestant and unionist backgrounds in the Derry area. Their contributions were thoughtful, forthright and challenging. Notably the two panellists said that no unionist politicians were giving leadership at this time. However, they also viewed the contemporary political decisions and behaviour of republicans as a measure for how they believed their identities, rights

and aspirations would be treated in a future

united Ireland.

Sinn Féin has a vision for the future and a strategy to bring about Irish unity.

Our political project takes its inspiration from the 'Spirit of 1798' and the United Irishmen and women. We are Irish republicans in the Wolfe Tone tradition; implacably anti-sectarian; committed to equality, rights, and national independence; dedicated to the unity of all our people – Catholic, Protestant, dissenter, and others. That is the essence of true, modern-day republicanism.

The conversation in Derry was based upon the conviction that republicans have to listen to, and learn from, our Protestant and unionist fellow citizens.

Those from Protestant or civic unionist, or political unionist, backgrounds do not constitute a monolith.

But republicans need Protestant citizens to help us better understand the diversity of Protestant identity and culture in all its forms. This is a period for us all to begin freeing up our thinking; to start challenging old orthodoxies and preconceptions; to push back against boundaries and barriers: to be brave. Republicans carry a responsibility to engage with Protestants and unionists and to understand their current concerns. These concerns and suspicions are real; for many shaped by hurt caused by the IRA during the conflict. But perhaps today they are also directly influenced by an insecurity fuelled by the growth and popularity of Sinn Féin across Ireland, and associated surge in support for Irish unity.

Of course, the momentum for Irish unity does not make it inevitable, but its achievement is now more likely than ever before. A Pandora's Box has been opened.

The future of the island is now in the melting pot. And although Sinn Féin believes that Irish unity is the best democratic option, republicans do not claim to have all the answers.

Constitutional change is a complex undertaking. It needs to be got right.

Our political landscape is complicated due to the legacy of colonialism in Ireland, and consequences of sectarianism, both past and present.

We need to be honest with each other. Our communal relationships are broken. Partition as a strategy to divide has worked. Our identities and cultural traditions are contested. However, diversity should be a cause of celebration, not contention.

Unconditional dialogue is the key to developing new understandings, addressing concerns, and removing both psychological and physical barriers.

We may never agree about the past. So maybe it's time we accepted that as a reality, and instead invest positive energy in trying to agree on the future.

That is, a future within a new constitutional framework which guarantees equality,

respect, and rights for all identities, cultural traditions, political opinions, and ethnic backgrounds.

Therefore, just as the Irish News editorial advocates, processes should be put in place to allow for thorough and thoughtful planning on constitutional change to formally begin, and for the proponents of reunification to respectfully persuade those with whom we share this island to choose a new constitutional settlement through the exercise of self-determination.

The Tory government is politically dysfunctional. This government 'got Brexit done', and it has no interest in the north of Ireland or any of the people who live here.

In these circumstances, the Irish government has an absolute political responsibility to lead out on planning the transition for Irish unity. The democratic logic is now inescapable; the moment has arrived; it is time to establish a Citizens' Assembly on Irish unity.

If political unionism has a positive vision to share, it should do so as we seek to build a new Ireland for all.

It cannot however be allowed to veto progress as democratic, nationalists and republicans seek to build a new Ireland for all.

# **BRITISH MINISTER OF** STATE SUGGESTS A UI REFERENDUM SHOULD NEED SUPPORT OF 'SUPER-MAJORITY'



British minister of State for the north Steve Baker has said a united Ireland referendum should need the support of a super-majority of voters in the north and south citing his own experience during the Brexit campaign.

Mr Baker, one of the leading figures behind the leave campaign in the run up to the 2016 vote, said he regretted that it did not require the support of 60 per cent of those who voted in the referendum.

Speaking in Co Kildare at the British Irish Parliamentary Assembly, Mr Baker said: "Would anyone here seriously want a 50 per cent plus one united Ireland result in Northern Ireland? I speak personally. I deliberately say it like that because some of you I know would want a 50+1 result. But just reflect on the trouble we had from running a 50 per cent plus one referendum in the United Kingdom."

Noting his own support for Brexit, Mr Baker, who led the Conservatives Party's pro-Brexit European Research Group, said they had not "properly prepared" for some of the consequences of Brexit.



#### KEIR STARMER CRITICISED ON 'BORDER POLL' REMARKS

British Labour leader Keir Starmer this month ruled out any notion of calling a border poll if he is to become the next British Prime Minister. He said, "I don't think we're anywhere near that kind of question. It's absolutely hypothetical. It's not even on the horizon."

Labour for Irish Unity criticised his remarks and released the statement attached.

We are very disappointed at Sir Keir Starmer's reported comments that, as far as he is concerned, an Irish border poll is "not even on the horizon".

This unilateral assertion is not in keeping with the Good Friday Agreement that states that it will be for the people of Ireland alone to exercise their right of self-determination by consent.

The Agreement makes no mention of there being any "honest brokers". The specific and limited role for a future Secretary of State for the Home Department is to direct the holding of a border poll if at any time it appears to him (or her) that a majority of those voting would express a wish that Northern Ireland should cease to be part of the United Kingdom and form part of a United Ireland.

The Labour Party risks being seen as myopic and partisan if it ignores the fact that the last local government election in Northern Ireland produced an Irish nationalist majority over unionists and in the most recent Assembly elections Sinn Fein attracted the most first preference votes. The SDLP, Labour's sister party in Northern Ireland, has also recently called for a border poll in 2030 and the Taoiseach of Ireland has said that he believes that there will be a United Ireland within his lifetime. There is also a serious and diverse conversation taking place on the Island of Ireland on the road to and content of a new and united Ireland.

What is perhaps more worrying about his remarks is that Sir Keir Starmer's opposition to even discuss the circumstances in which a border poll will be held echoes the views of the most obturate brand of Northern Ireland Unionists and shows a reluctance to recognise that the Good Friday Agreement recognises that British sovereignty over Ireland against its citizens' wishes may come to an end within a timetable indicated by the wishes of a majority in Northern Ireland not in Westminster.

#### SNP BACKS REVISED PLAN FOR SCOTTISH INDEPENDENCE REFERENDUM

Declan Kearney MLA travelled to the SNP conference in Aberdeen. He said there was strong confidence & momentum amongst members for the SNP strategy to achieve independence. The First Minister Humza Yousaf vowed the party's manifesto would say "On page



one, line one: Vote SNP for Scotland to become an independent Country". He also said if the SNP wins the majority of seats in Scotland in the next general election, it will demand that the powers to hold a referendum are transferred to the Scotlish Parliament.

# UNPRECEDENTED GLOBAL SUPPORT FOR IRISH UNITY

Sinn Féin's Chris Hazzard has said the reunification of Ireland will be a beacon for progressive movements throughout the world.

The South Down MP addressed Dilemmas of Humanity Conference in Johannesburg where 500 members and leaders of social movements, political parties, and trade unions from more than 75 counties had gathered to chart out a path toward building a better world.

The Dilemmas conference is part of a broad political, cultural and social process that has included multiple regional conferences and 260 participating organisations from the Americas, Africa, Asia, Europe and the Middle East. Chris Hazzard commented: "It was fantastic to be invited to address the conference, and provide an update on the political situation in Ireland and Europe more broadly. There was huge interest and support for the continued electoral success of Sinn Féin and the movement for Irish reunification. "Ireland was the first country in the world to be colonised - nearly 900 years ago. In every generation since we have struggled for independence, and we have done so with great support from the International community," he

Chris Hazzard said his party's policies and values are shaped by huge connections with other political struggles throughout the world. "This process of solidarity has shaped the internationalism of Sinn Féin today; we are deeply aware of our interconnectedness with the humanity of the world.

"We have always been, and will always remain proactive in reaching out to progressive movements across the world; movements that share our politics, our values, and our ambition to build a better world.

"Irish reunification and the fulfilment of the sovereignty of the Irish people is undoubtedly now possible, and within reach.

"As we stand on the edge of historic political, social and economic transformation in Ireland it is clear that a reunified Ireland would also be a beacon for progressive movements throughout the world," he concluded.

# We are all Palestinians now...

As the horrific casualty list from Gaza mounts each day, events on the west Bank are rarely reported.

Even if Israel occupies the rubble of a Gaza City levelled by its scorched earth policy, forcibly evicts or kills those Gazans living in the northern half of that territory, and annexes it as part of a land grab for the greater Israeli state envisioned by Netanyahu, this will all have the opposite effect its strategists are predicting. The history of colonialism is littered with examples of oppressed peoples emerging stronger and more determined in pursuit of their right to self-determination.

If colonialism and our own experience teaches us anything it is that Israeli actions are more likely to embolden opposition to Israeli occupation not defeat it. Past Israeli actions, the blockade of Gaza for almost 20 years, the flouting of international law and its apartheid policy, have not diminished the Palestinian desire for freedom and justice.

The failure of the international community to stand up for international law and to defend

Palestinian rights has led us to this current nightmare.

Moreover, there is now a real danger that the conflict will extend beyond Gaza and the west Bank and embroil the region. It may be several decades since Arab states and Israel clashed on the battlefield but concern at Israeli aggression is mounting in the neighbouring states. From Lebanon to Jordan to Syria, to Iran and Egypt tensions are rising. There are real risks of a calamitous escalation. It is still not too late to turn back from the abyss. It will need leadership and courage by all sides and a willingness to take huge personal and political risks for peace. It especially demands that the international community defend the Palestinian people of Gaza and of the west Bank. The massive solidarity demonstrations last weekend with the Palestinian people in Ireland and around the world can help change the narrative. The increasing numbers of voices demanding a complete cessation by all sides and an end to the humanitarian catastrophe that is taking place in Gaza, are evidence too that there remains a deep well of compassion for all victims.





# IMELDA MAY LEADS TOUR OF HISTORIC MOORE STREET

Singer and actress Imelda May led a walking tour of the key sites around Moore Street this month, where women took part in the 1916 Easter Rising in Dublin. Hundreds of people gathered and the tour was delivered by historians Liz Gillis and Honor Ó Brolcháin, grand niece of Joseph Mary Plunkett, on behalf of the Moore Street Preservation Trust.

Imelda May said, "It's important to be here. We have to constantly fight for our heritage.

"We have our freedom walking around this city because of those heroes in 1916. I think their memory should be honoured.

"It's normal to have development in a city and change is normal but it should be done with some balance and sensitivity, especially when it comes to our cultural heritage."

Imelda spoke of her proudness of her grandmother being a member of Cumann na mBan and said she was representing her.

"She was a wonderful woman. They were running up and down all around here and putting their lives at risk for us. Her blood is in my veins so I'm here to represent her and all of the other women that literally ran through the flames with the wounded men to get them to Jervis Street hospital."
