### Irish unity is within our grasp – Mary Lou McDonald

Sinn Féin President, Mary Lou McDonald TD has reflected the significance of Michelle O'Neill becoming First Minister as a clear emblem of the wider change happening across Ireland.

The Sinn Féin leader said:

"It's unmissable.

"It's here in the north but it is echoed throughout the island.

"There's a conversation underway about what happens next – twenty five years on from the Good Friday Agreement.

"What does Ireland look like in five years time, in ten years time, in a generation's time.

"That's a very exciting conversation.

"I think the days of partition are numbered.

"It doesn't work.

"There's a cost to partition.

"We have started our conversation.

"The reality is that so long as Ireland is partitioned we will face very significant economic challenges and disadvantages here in the north and all along the border.

"The facts are that the big opportunities from our island whether it is in terms of the climate catastrophe and renewable energies and how we develop that, our skills base, our innovation and research base, all of those things only make sense on an all-island basis."
